Do you know who said this?

"Tomorrow is the most important thing in life. Comes in to us at midnight very clean. It's perfect when it arrives and it puts itself in our hands and hopes we've learnt something from yesterday."

You might be as surprised as I was to learn that the author of these lines is none other than movie actor John Wayne! (We drove by his birthplace in Winterset, Iowa recently. To think of this Western hero coming from the farm state of Iowa may be as surprising as discovering that his real name was Marion Robert Morrison. "Whoa!") Quick on the draw, with both words and weapons, the characters Wayne played might not have always been thinking about tomorrow as much as today. But in the long run, I would have to guess that the men of integrity he usually portrayed did what they had to do today because of what tomorrow would be like if they didn't.

Words for the Soul and Body

Graduations and weddings often create an opportunity for guests to submit words of advice for how to get along with others or how to have a lasting marriage. My words of wisdom don't count for much, so I've started to share the words of One who has far more wisdom than any person can ever obtain. They're the words from Ephesians 4:32 "Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as Godin Christ forgave you."

Learning to forgive takes work because forgiveness doesn't come naturally. As a result of our sinful natures, forgiveness is not a part of our genetic makeup. Our human nature is more inclined to get even, or hold a grudge, or withhold forgiveness until a certain amount of penance has been paid by the offender. God, on the other hand, out of His goodness, grace, and mercy forgives us of all our sins. That's the example of forgiveness God sets before us: He desired for us to live with Him in His kingdom and then removed the yolk of sin that would have prevented that from happening. It's only after we recognize our own need for forgiveness and rejoice in that forgiveness that we can begin — with God's help — to forgive others.

We may have the perfect model of how to forgive and know what it means to be forgiven, but forgiving others doesn't come as easily. C.S. Lewis said it best, "Everyone says forgiveness is a lovely idea, until they have something to forgive."

I'm sure it won't surprise you to hear that the ability to forgive improves your health, your relationships, and your outlook on life. A study recorded in the Journal of Adult Development found that those who were able to forgive were more satisfied with their lives and less likely to report feelings of nervousness, restlessness, or sadness. Every time a person thinks of his/her transgressor, the body responds: blood pressure and heart rate increases; facial muscles tense; stress hormones kick in; and over time, that revved up condition takes its toll by affecting the immune and cardiovascular systems. Forgiveness, on the other hand, reduces stress.

Forgiving others is not a sign of weakness but of strength. Forgiveness takes courage and a determination to let go of events and situations that can preoccupy our minds and drag us down. It doesn't mean that you won't ever recall the hurt and the events of the past, you simply will choose not to dwell there.

Learning to forgive is not easy, nor is it something that is mastered right away. There's a very good chance we will be working on that education for the rest of our earthly lives!



The Rev. Dr. Matthew C. Harrison has been elected to his fifth term as LCMS president — a position he has held since 2010.

Harrison elected to serve fifth term as LCMS president

The Rev. Dr. Matthew C. Harrison, having received 52.32% of the votes cast, is the president-elect of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) for a fifth term of office, 2023–2026.

The nominations process for the position of Synod president began last fall. The resulting candidates were the five ordained ministers who received the highest number of votes in the nominations process and who consented to serve if elected: Harrison, the incumbent president; the Rev. Dr. Patrick T. Ferry, former president of Concordia University Wisconsin and Ann Arbor; the Rev. Richard L. Snow, president of the LCMS Nebraska District; the Rev. Peter K. Lange, LCMS first vice-president; and the Rev. Benjamin T. Ball, LCMS sixth vice-president.

The election took place, according to Bylaw 3.12.2.4, starting June 17 (six weeks prior to the convention) via internet balloting provided by YesElections (formerly Election-America). The 6,053 pastoral and lay voters validly registered by the congregations and parishes of the Synod (Bylaw 3.12.2.3) before the deadline (electronic registration by March 19) or their substitutes (as validly submitted before June 9) served as the voters for this election. Of those, a total of 5,000 votes were cast, constituting a vote percentage of 82.60% of the electorate.

The results of the ballot tallied and reported to the Secretary of the Synod by YesElections are as follows:

- Harrison was voted president-elect with 2,616 votes (52.32%);
- Ferry received 1,593 votes (31.86%);
- Ball received 341 votes (6.82%);
- Snow received 318 votes (6.36%); and
- Lange received 132 votes (2.64%).

Additional information about the election result will be published in the second issue of *Today's Business*, which will be available at the beginning of the convention. For more information about the election or candidates, see lcms.org/convention/national/elections.
